Venture Cup fever

Venture Cup, which is open to staff, students and alumni, is a startup pitch competition that sees a winning team receiving \$20,000 in venture funding.

"For example, we're currently supporting discussions between Swinburne and industry on using blockchain for supply management."



What makes us special ...

While most university innovation hubs have been around for some years, Swinburne's Innovation Precinct is one of the newest university-led innovation teams. This means the team has an opportunity to learn from other innovation precincts and hubs, and also create their own path and do things differently – to meet the needs of future markets and industry.

The Innovation Precinct is under the umbrella of Swinburne Research. As a result the Precinct has a strong focus on researchled innovation across Swinburne's capabilities. "It makes us unique, when compared to other universities – this focus on research," John says.

The team hosts a monthly lunch for the Swinburne Research team at the Fire Station. "Our lunches are usually themed, like a Christmas in July lunch, where the team enjoyed roast pork and crackling, apple sauce, baked potatoes, finished off with Christmas cake, and Elf on the TV," John says.
